

Shine in Obedience

Read Daniel 6:1-28

Why is a life of obedience so important? And how does being obedient allow us to "shine" in a dark world? This month, we will dig into the life of Daniel and see how his obedience to God made a big difference.


Daniel's life is full of examples of how to be courageous and how to stand up for God. When Daniel was a teenager, he was captured and taken to Babylon. Even as a young captive, he stood up for God and refused to defile himself by eating the king's meat and drinking the king's wine (Daniel 1:8). God blessed Daniel's decision, and kept him strong and healthy. He was one of the best young men in the kingdom—healthy, strong, and smart—and the king was impressed with him and his friends.

Daniel also had great talent in interpreting dreams (Daniel 1:17). When none of the magicians and astrologers were able to interpret the king's dream, Daniel and his friends prayed and asked God to help them. God did, and Daniel was able to interpret King Nebuchadnezzar's dream. The king was so impressed with Daniel that he made him the chief governor over all the wise men of Babylon (Daniel 2:49).

Because Daniel was faithful to God, he was blessed and successful. When King Darius took over the kingdom (Daniel 6:1), he recognized that "an excellent spirit" was in Daniel (Daniel 6:3). Seeing this inner quality, he put Daniel in the highest leadership position, over all the other presidents and princes of the kingdom.

The presidents and princes got together and tried to find something about Daniel that they could use against him to get him kicked out of his position, but they couldn't find a single bad thing about him. They knew that Daniel was faithful to God, so they decided to use his faith against him.

They went to the king and convinced him to make a decree. Imagine how you would feel if this letter showed up at your door:



The presidents, governors, princes, counselors and captains have issued a new royal statute. This is our firm decree: From this day forward, no man shall ask a petition of any God or man for thirty days. If a man has need to ask a petition, he shall ask only the King. He that does not heed these words shall be thrown into a den of lions.

Daniel got a letter just like that, sealed with a stamp from the king's ring. And Daniel knew he had a big decision to make. He could obey the king's new law, or he could obey God and continue to be faithful to Him. Daniel chose to obey God.

The princes and presidents were watching Daniel. And when they saw him kneel in prayer to God, they ran to the king to tell on him. When the king heard that it was Daniel who had broken his law, he was upset. All day, he tried to think of a way out of the law, so Daniel could avoid punishment. When the sun started to set, the princes and presidents came to the king and demanded that Daniel be punished.


The king reluctantly commanded that they go get Daniel and throw him into the lion's den. The king told Daniel, "Thy God whom thou servest continually, he will deliver thee" (Daniel 6:16). Then the lions' den was sealed with a stone. The king went back to his palace and spent the night fasting and hoping that Daniel would be delivered.

The next morning, the king got up very early and ran to the lions' den. He called out to Daniel, and to his delight, Daniel answered him. He told the king that God has sent his angel to shut the lions' mouths (Daniel 6:22), and that he was unharmed.

The king was excited that Daniel was safe. He pulled Daniel out of the lions' den, knowing that Daniels' faith in God and obedience to God had kept him safe.

The king then called for the princes and presidents who had accused Daniel and tricked the king into making the decree. Because of their evil actions (against Daniel and God), they were thrown into the lions' den and killed.

Then, the king wrote a new decree:



GET REAL—Apply God's Word to your life.

Romans 5:19 says, "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous."

This verse is talking about Jesus's obedience to death on the cross. The suffering that Jesus went through was God's plan, and even though it was hard, Jesus obeyed.

Sometimes, God will ask us to do things that we don't want to do. Sometimes, in order for God to bless us, we have to get out of our comfort zone and do hard things.
