



DECIDING TO LIVE A LIFESTYLE OF PURITY

"Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Savior Jesus Christ" (Titus 2:12-13).

When a bride walks down the aisle, she wants to be the most beautiful woman in the room. One the most important decisions when planning a wedding is picking out the perfect dress. In our culture, brides usually dress in white to represent purity. No matter how you would dress for an earthly

groom, remember that our Heavenly Groom, Jesus, sees us from the inside out. In order to be the most beautiful bride for Him, we need to commit to lives of purity so that our hearts are pure and white when He comes for us.

When we think about purity, we usually think about sex. We are supposed to remain sexually pure until we are married, but living a lifestyle of purity is so much more than just saying no to sex. When we commit to God that we will be pure, it's a lifestyle commitment that affects our friendships, our thoughts, our actions, and every decision we make.

In 1 Corinthians 7: 34 Paul said, "...The unmarried woman careth for the things of the Lord, that she may be holy both in body and spirit."

I know what it means to be "boy crazy." Trust me, I have been there. There's nothing wrong with us having crushes or boyfriends, but we have to put God first. As unmarried young women, we have to "keep [our hearts] with all diligence" (Proverbs 4:23). The people (boys and girls) that we hang out with, the music we listen to, the places we go, the clothes we wear... all of these things influence our hearts. If we want our hearts to be pure, we have to keep these other areas of our lives pure, too.

Our greatest hope for remaining pure is walking with Christ. Walking with Him doesn't mean that we won't ever be tempted, but staying in His presence and in His Word gives us a greater defense against Satan's lies.
